# CHAIRMAN'S NEW YEAR MESSAGE Nigel Daley

On the Reserve, over the next twelve months, we have much to look forward to: the cattle meadow project will finally be coming to fruition over the forthcoming weeks on the land to the north of Stocker's Lake, the CCTV project on the Heronry is progressing well and we are hoping for some live action on the nests this spring.

We have enjoyed two very successful recruitment days on the lake with over eighty new members joining. We also have a number of wildlife and nature walks organised for the next twelve months which are being advertised in the Events Calendar. Sunday morning work parties continue to be extremely well attended by our members, many thanks to all for your continued support. We have now moved our tool and equipment store into the fishermen's shed.

On a slightly more concerning note, we all need to be aware of the Three Rivers District Councils planning consultation and Hillingdon Council's planning proposals for various sites around the edge of the Reserve. There will, without any shadow of doubt be serious implications for the wildlife and Flora around our Nature Reserve. Please watch this issue carefully over the coming months/years as I do not believe it will just go away!

#### **EVENTS ON THE RESERVE**

#### Mink & Water Voles - Ian Watson

Some of us will remember sighting the delightful water voles on the River Colne by Stocker's Lake. Then in the 1990's came the mink and that was the end of the water voles. Richard Drew, our muchloved warden, combatted the mink with some success but the voles did not return, although they are found in the Misbourne River and also in the River Chess quite near Rickmansworth.

We and the Trust would like to see the return of the voles and as a preliminary the Trust wish to place a couple of mink rafts on the reserve to record the presence or otherwise of mink and water voles. The rafts have a clay patch which will record the footprints of any small creature using the raft. It needs checking, ideally every fortnight, to record and identify the footprints, either by referring to a footprint chart (which will be supplied) or by taking a mobile phone photograph and then reporting to Martin Ketcher at the Trust.

Ideally, this would be done by a small team of likeminded people, rather like Barbara James' team who do the annual April-September Butterfly survey. Mink tend to be most active in March/April and Aug/Sep/Oct.

#### Heron Nest Camera Project Update-Dick Beeden

You will recall last year we installed cameras on two heron nests on the island in the lake. All did not go to plan because unhelpfully the herons chose not to use the nests in the cameras' fields of view.

We have not given up. At least we know the solar power system, cameras and transmitter out on the island work unattended. Since then we have moved one camera and replaced the other with one that can be remotely controlled from the shore. So, if again the herons chose the wrong nest sites (from our point of view) we should be able to realign at least one of the cameras and capture what is going on

Also, to make using the system easier Affinity Water have agreed that we can run power to Kingfisher Hide from the pumping station. That means that we will no longer have to lug heavy batteries to the hide where we receive the signal from the island in order to power up the shore-based hardware.

At the time of writing for this newsletter both these elements are still works in progress but we expect to have the system up and running for the next nesting season in a few weeks time.

#### Survey of Butterflies at Stocker's Lake 2018

#### The recording scheme



Once again, a dedicated band of enthusiasts under the leadership of Barbara James recorded the number of butterflies seen in 12 transects around

the lake each week between April and September. Entering their results directly onto the UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme.

#### Total butterflies counted by year

Butterfly counts at Stocker's Lake are now available for 10 years in 2 periods, 1997-1999 and 2012-2018, so we are increasingly able to compare numbers counted and ascertain trends.

2018 was a record year around the lake with 1,113 butterflies counted,36% up on 2017, and 3% higher than the previous record in 1997. The distribution of sightings over the recording period confirms that this was once again heavily influenced by the weather. The hot dry spell from the end of June to mid-August when the maximum temperature regularly exceeded 30 degrees helped to make the summer of 2018 the joint hottest on record.

#### The National Picture

The report on Butterfly Conservation's Big Butterfly Count held each summer states that the hot dry weather should have benefited most butterflies but several species still experienced a slump. Numbers of Red Admiral, Comma and Small Tortoiseshell decreased by 73%. 40% and 12% respectively compared to 2017, which was also a bad year for them. By contrast, the Whites had a bumper year with increases of 161%,104% and 78% respectively for Small, Large and Green-veined Whites, making up more than half of the total sightings
