# FoSL 2023 Wall Calendars Project Update

At its September meeting our FoSL Committee authorised the printing of 150 FoSL 2023 Wall calendars with a view to selling as many as possible at a price of £10 each and hopefully making a good profit. 3 calendars were given as courtesy Christmas gifts to each of Josh Kalms (HMWT), Sophie Mortimer (Affinity Water) and Ian Watson (our former Chairman). After postage and packing etc we made a profit of **around £550**. There have been other benefits too. It has attracted at least one new (photographer) member and has generated some positive publicity beyond our existing membership.

#### Rare Visitor to the Lake

A rare visitor, the Smew, was being seen regularly on the lake during early December.

The Smew is a small, attractive, diving duck which is a rare winter visitor to the UK. In a normal year only between 100 and 200 birds are reported nationally and it is several years since one was last recorded at the reserve. So the news that one was being seen regularly at the western end of the lake, day after day, was very exciting. It led to plenty of birdwatchers visiting, hoping for a glimpse.

The bird was seen daily from December 4<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> inclusive but then the recent severe, cold spell of weather set in and the lake froze over. This forced



#### Cold snap freezes lake almost completely

# Our Annual Butterfly Survey showed that 2022 Butterfly numbers were up but were disappointing again



As usual a team of FoSL observers monitored the reserve's butterflies in 2022. Given the hot, dry weather during parts of the summer, which would normally be expected to be good for butterflies, 2022 must be classed as another disappointing year even though the total number recorded (547) was better than both 2021 (446) and covid curtailed 2020 (518).

## **Bat Survey September 2022**

The season started well and in a very short trapping session we caught 3 Nathusius pipistrelles, 9 Soprano pipistrelles & 1 Daubenton's bat. A recording breaking year for Stockers!



#### **The National Nathusius Monitoring Programme**

came to a grinding halt with the outbreak of Covid. There was a serious concern that bat workers might give Covid to the bats. Following much discussion, some strict protocols were introduced by the IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources) and Natural England issued the national licence to restart surveying this autumn.

Stocker's Lake Nature Reserve has always been one of the best sites for Nathusius pipistrelles (Pipistrellus nathusii). Three surveys have been carried out at Stocker's resulting in 14 Nathusius being ringed including 5 females. 2022 has been a record breaking year for the site. The best survey was on 28th September when we caught 10 Nathusius in just 1 1/2 hours before we had to stop mist netting due to the low temperature. We were obviously in the right place at the right time for Nathusius to be passing through maybe they had recently migrated to the UK? Other species encountered were Common pipistrelle pipistrellus), (Pipistrellus Soprano pipistrelle (Pipistrellus pygmaeus) and Daubenton's bat (Myotis

daubentonii).
