WORK ON THE RESERVE

Work Party Sunday 5 January lan Watson

This was a splendid morning's work preparing the reserve for planting 149 Gandhi anniversary trees in March. The first group cleared thick brambles along the river Colne to make way for trees. We never forget



that brambles give wonderful safe nesting for small birds but these bramble patches had grown to well over 20 feet deep so we only cut about 6 or 7 feet away. The second group tidled and strimmed the

bramble area we had cleared at our last work party whilst a third group cleared up some of the brambles and willow encroaching on our fourth meadow. The branches from the willow clearing have been used to create a long staked dead-hedge that will provide a vital habitat for hibernating hedgehogs and for low-level nesting birds. This was really hard work, cheerfully done. Work Party Sunday 2 February

included cutting back encroaching willow and using the waste material to create habitat for the local wild life community. We have Nick Maksimovic to thank for quidance with the habitat methods and

the heavy duty tree pruning. In addition to helping with these preparations a small group also carried out a litter sweep. The large amount they retrieved proved how essential the task is. We may need a larger flask for tea and coffee in future due to the exceptionally large turnout today.

Work Party Sunday 1 March lan Watson

Another good and hard morning's work on what may in time become our fourth cattle meadow, which will help the wild flowers. It will also help preserve unimproved grassland – an increasingly rare habitat throughout England. Tree work is already being



undertaken by FoSL which should increase the meadow area by 40-50%. The final fencing should allow us to create another hedge with 500-600 hedgerow plants – more great habitat for small birds and mammals.

We also recruited 4 new members who paid up on the spot. EVENTS ON THE RESERVE

Wildfowl Walk 12 January

Dick Beeden lead the walk which was attended by 6 other people. Like last year it was windy and cool but clouds scudding across the sky in the strong winds gave periods of bright sunshine on and off throughout the morning. This gave pretty good light for identifying the birds most of the time. There were a good number on the lake but the surrounding trees etc were fairly quiet but we saw all the species we heard and ended with a tally of 30 species (half a dozen less than last year).

The full list was:

Great-crested Grebe; Cormorant; Grey Heron; Little Egret; Mute Swan; Canada Goose; Egyptian Goose; Mallard; Shoveler (probably 150 or so); Red-crested Pochard (two groups of 6 or so at each end of the lake); Pochard; Tufted Duck; Wigeon (maybe a dozen compared with a lot last year); Gadwall; Wren; Goldeneve: (males and females in modest numbers with one male displaying); Moorhen; Coot; Lapwing (more than we thought out on the islands once you got your eye in); Black-headed Gull (lots); Lesser Black-backed Gull (several); Woodpigeon; Ringnecked Parakeet; Jay (good views); Robin; Blue Tit; Great Tit; Long-tailed Tit (at least two flocks); Goldfinch; Magpie. There were some noticeable absentees apart from Smew and Goosander namely; no raptors; Kingfisher; Woodpecker; Dunnock; Chaffinch; Starling; Blackbird; Wren; siskin and Carrion Crow.

Not counted in the tally was the unexpected sighting of an American Wood Duck being fed along with 2 swans and a few Mallards by the seat in

the North West corner of Bury Lake as we made our way back along the causeway. It would be nice to think this was a very rare migrant blown across the Atlantic (winds are strong enough at the moment) but it is much more likely to be an escapee used to humans being around and a source of food. Still like others on the walk I have never seen one in the wild before.

We also stopped in Kingfisher hide to have a look at the heronry through the nest cameras out on the islands. Interestingly several birds were occupying nest sites but not yet displaying nesting behaviour (unlike my visit a few days later when at least two pairs looked like they were into nest building). Given that the earliest eggs might well be laid at the end of January this is not unexpected.

Wildfowl Walk 16 February

As expected given the arrival of storm Dennis on Saturday and overnight into Sunday, no-one turned up

for the walk and it was very wet underfoot. In any case it would have been a bit disappointing as there was not a lot to see, in part because of the strong winds and in part because it has just not been cold enough to drive the migrants this far south.

On Bury Lake (from the causeway) there were some widgeon, lots of coot and tufted ducks, a few great crested grebe, a few swans, a few cormorants and the odd mallard.

On Stockers there was a flotilla of over 50 Canada geese (which took off en masse, rather spectacular), coot, tufted ducks, a large number of shoveller, a pair of golden eye (in front of Kingfisher hide), black headed, lesser black back and herring gulls, herons and not much else. Small birds were definitely keeping their heads down. I saw none. Unexpectedly the flooded meadow on Stockers Farm was also very quiet.

I did make good use of the time though as I was able to monitor the heron nests out on the island using our cameras. There is nesting behaviour going on at quite a lot of nests and it is possible that a couple have eggs with herons sitting tight. This picture of nest 4 looks promising for chicks fairly soon. Expect 3 to 5 eggs. Incubation is about 25 days so we might get chicks in the last week in Feb. Fledging takes a further 6 to 8 weeks. So watch this space.



Report from Dick Beeden 15 April

Having, I think, now recovered from the dreaded virus (6 weeks and counting), on 15 April I took a short walk from Stockers House to Kingfisher Hide to undertake my weekly heron nest camera survey. There were a few walkers along the path but fewer than might be expected now that they have closed the Aquadrome car park. The herons and egrets are nesting and the heron chicks range from just out of the shell to nearly mature. The egrets look as though they are getting down to nesting and breeding but so far I do not have a good view of an egret nest. Here's hoping.

But that was not all. I saw my first **Swallow** of the year over Stockers Farm; A pair of **pied Wagtail** were enjoying the muddy margins of the flood meadow (along with countless **Canada geese** and **blackheaded gulls**). Three Canada geese were out cropping the field by Stockers House; not something you see that often because there are usually too many people and dogs. I was serenaded by the usual **wrens**, **robins**, **tits** and **chaffinches** but also **blackcap** and **Cetti warblers**.

There were also **Brimstone**, orange tip, small and large white and, **peacock butterflies** flitting about in small numbers.

So things are really coming alive. Unfortunately as the trees come into leaf on the island the view of a number of nests are becoming obscured but I think we will be ok for viewing at least three nests.



Wildflower Survey on the cattle meadows Linda Ascroft



Last year, as many of you will be aware, cattle were reintroduced to Stocker's Lake meadows. One of the main reasons for this is to manage and improve the grassland for the benefit of wildflowers. To get a good picture of the wildflowers presently growing on the meadows we decided to start a methodical survey of the 3 meadows. This will be done, probably 3 times, during each year, thereby creating an annual record of how the wildflowers in these meadows change over time. In early March an email went out to all members seeking volunteers with good/some knowledge of wildflowers and grasses. We have 9 volunteers in total but are always pleased to have more — so if anyone else is interested then please contact me.

By the third week in March, with the invaluable support of Josh Kalms from Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust, we were ready to mark out the fields and to have our training day. Unfortunately, at the same time, face to face meetings were being curtailed due to Covid-19 and the rest is history. So, for now our survey is on hold.

Needless to say the wildflowers will still be there when we are able to re-start our survey and we look forward to this time.
